It's been a very hectic couple of weeks back in organising the instrumental program. All children by now have met their instrumental teacher and had their 1st or even 2nd lesson. Children should know what day their lessons are on and have a timetable highlighted with times for their lessons. All children received their instrument that they are borrowing from the school in their first lesson, as long as the loan agreement forms and monies were returned. Please go through the CD in the tutor book to help with putting it together and pulling it apart. It's a great way of learning together, getting to know the instrument and reinforcing the first couple of lessons. If your child has paid for an instrumental music folder, they should have already received one or will be getting it next few weeks. We have purchased more and just waiting for them to arrive. You do not need to purchase a new folder if you already have one. Thank you for your prompt return of contracts, payments and loan agreement forms.

I have been thrilled with the excitement of our beginner instrumnentalists so far. Not only are they remembering to turn up to lessons but are also giving up their lunchtimes to come in and share their lovely 'sounds'. They are recording every minute of practise that adds up to their 100 mins over the week.

Awesome effort!! Well done to you all!! © ① Just a reminder that the school instruments are not to be used out in the play areas. If students are willing to practise during lunch please come and use the music rooms.

We are looking for more brass students. If there are any willing children to try out for trombone or trumpet, can you please come and see me ASAP so you can be tested. A school instrument will be available to loan to the successful applicant.

Timetables were uploaded to the school webpage and also been given to your child's teacher for display in their classroom. They are also on display outside the Performance Art Centre. Please print a copy and place on the fridge and/or in your child's diary. The first term is usually the hardest in getting organized and forming a routine. All instrumental timetables are a weekly rotation to avoid your child missing out on the same classroom lesson weekly. Children should be getting to know who are in their group, know where they are located in the school and collect each other on the way over to the lesson. This will avoid continual disruptions and lesson time being shortened. It's a good idea to arrive at least 5 mins prior to be ready to start on time. There is a timetable at the end of this newsletter with days/times of rehearsals/lessons for your information.

Helping your child become organized for their lesson will help create responsibility and routine. There will be times during this first term and early second term of struggle and a feeling they will not

succeed and wanting to 'quit'. Encouraging daily practice, being persistent, problem solving, showing enthusiasm, giving praise and supporting your child's learning in these first few lessons will help overcome these fears and hurdles and build a feeling of success and confidence. If you feel your child is not coping or would like some help, please contact your child's teacher so this learning experience is fun.

If your child accidently leaves their instrument at home, it is essential that they still attend their lesson at their scheduled time. Lessons cannot be made up due to other lessons being scheduled and varying ability of groups. Your child can practice the concepts and techniques taught during that lesson at home ready for the following lesson.

Please be reminded that is a requirement that your child is part of one or more school ensembles. This is part of receiving free instrumental lessons and is clearly stated in the instrumental contract. Being part of a group is a rewarding experience that has proven to further enhance students' musical understanding as well as teaching important skills such as team work and responsibility. Your child will have a feeling of success, improved confidence, sense of belonging and willingness to learn.

The storage room is available for your children to store their instruments in preparation for their lesson. However, it will be locked at 3pm and your child is asked to come over before the bell goes to take their instrument back home. It is a small room and it does become a tight squeeze with lots of instruments.

WOW AWARDS - Recognition of Practice and Great Work ~~STARTS THIS WEEK "~~

Students need to maintain the consistent home practice on their instrument in order to continue steadily progressing on their playing technique and note reading skills. To help acknowledge those students who regularly practice, the music staff has developed 2 ways to reward consistent home practice.

The first reward is the "WOW" draw. For students to be eligible, they need to undertake in 60 minutes of quality practice of both lesson and ensemble repertoire. It's an act that WOWs your teacher. For example - memorizing a piece of music, improving your tonguing/buzzing/bow technique etc. WOW slips are paced in the WOW bin for a lucky draw prize that will be drawn every week. The student who is drawn from the WOW bin will have their choice of receiving a happy gram, icy cup or tuckshop voucher.

How many WOW slips will you get in the bin this term?

The second draw is the 100 minutes club. This club is for students who undertake in 100 minutes or more of home practice every week. If 100 minutes are reached every week, the students name will be documented on the 100 minute club chart found in the music practice room. They will also be given a "Happy Gram" for their achievement that week. However, for the students whose names remain on the 100 minute chart all term will receive an lcy Cup. By the end of the year, students who have remained on the chart for the whole year will be invited to 100 minute club party held the end of Term 4.

Junior & Senior Choirs - Fiona Coleman

We held auditions a couple of weeks ago for all children in years 1 – 6 interested in being a member of our choral program. The choir gives the children an opportunity to improve their singing skills outside the music classroom. They have an opportunity to read music, practice musicianship skills, sing in parts, have increased friendships and improved social skills. The children have been auditioned and invited based on the quality of their voice and by identifying pitch rather than their singing experience. We have played a number of varying pitches in the voice range to accommodate all children's voices and they had to hear and sing the same pitch back with a quality tone. Any child can sing a song, but when working together as an ensemble, pitch recognition and creating harmonies is needed for quality sound. We are delighted to see so many children willing to extend their musical abilities outside the music classroom and we understand there will be a few sad faces. We are not at all saying no to your child forever and if they feel they can do better as the year goes on, please come and re-audition.

If your child was successful in the auditions, they received a letter of congratulations last week and a contract of commitment form. Thanks already to the parents who have returned forms and paid \$5 for covering wear and tear of shirts. Please ensure students have a display folder to keep music/words in and it is brought to all rehearsals. An electronic roll will be set up so children are recording their attendance and it will be included as an extra-curricular activity on their report card. Children will be invited to eisteddfod and other performances based on their attendance and effort recorded in the roll. Junior Rehearsal started last week on Wednesday at

1st break. Senior Rehearsals started last Friday and will continue on Friday's for this term at 2nd break. Morning rehearsals will start in Term 2. Children will be notified of when this is to start and it published here in our newsletter.

Music Shirts, Folders/Music, School Instruments

Thanks to the couple of parents who have already volunteered their time to help wash shirts. Thanks also for the prompt payments. We do ask that your child is prepared for any upcoming performances. It is a requirement that all children wear with their shirts, navy blue skirts, skorts or shorts, white ankle socks (above the shoe) and black closed in shoes for performances. We do have some black shoes that have been kindly donated to the music department for children if you have difficulty in finding a pair. We ask that you do not go to a lot of expense. Most children have received their school instrumental folder. If you have paid and your child has still not received theirs, please come and see us. There is no need to purchase another folder if you already own one.
